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Word of the day for esl students

The goal is for them to learn 1 new word every day to make it more effective, but they are free to learn as much/as little as they want (ideally at least 3 words a week). This worksheet is ideal for any level! In a classroom where language is at the forefront, a student with communication or dyslexia problems may find himself completely lost. A single page of text can have hundreds of words, thousands of letters and a whole world of anguish for your students. If you have English students in your class, for them, language is the biggest obstacle. I love the whole premise of his Word of the Day lesson. What if that word was the little rock at the top of the mountain that starts an avalanche? Learning a new word can create a cascade of thought that leads to a better command of a language. Students begin to think about how they use the word. They look at their own vocabulary to create a sentence where the word will adapt. They think about when and where to use such a word. I am writing this post from the perspective that Ms. Noonan invited me to her class to see if I could support some of her students who are learning a little differently. In this case, my role is to adapt his Word of the Day lesson for struggling students. All too often, general education teachers come forward to create an inclusive classroom, only to discover that their students do not necessarily come with the support they need to succeed. But this position is located in a perfect world, where the teacher in an inclusive classroom can ask for help and get it - not only by having someone observe the lesson and make suggestions, but also with curriculum and classroom supports. You'll find these free related media in this post so you can use them in your own classroom. Adapting the lesson The first thing I noticed in Mrs. Noonan's room were the words. The whole room is covered with words. It makes sense in a room where learning more words is of the utmost importance, but I can see how a single word of the day could get lost in all these words. What is excellent, however, is the number of times the class returns to the Word of the Day. This repetition is the best way for inclusion students to learn, as the repetition is in place, I looked for ways to boost it even more, but in a different way. My suggestions to Ms. Noonan would be: Add visual elements to her Word of the Day lesson. Since the word of the day is supposed to stand out from all the other words, I suggest finding a place in the room where students could write the word they chose. Chosen. I helped her. I made a poster Word of the Day in English and Spanish. Once rolled, it can work like a dry erase board so that students can change the word every day. Using a colorful poster, the word of the day will stand out among the other words displayed on the wall. It also means that when a student has trouble remembering the word of the day, they have a quick reference point. Since practice and repetition are excellent ways to learn vocabulary, I looked for other ways for a student to keep track of these vocabulary words highlighted. The first is a monthly tracking sheet that can be kept in a notebook or displayed on the wall, in English, Spanish or both! This could be put right next to the word in the poster of the day and, before a new word is chosen, yesterday's word could be moved to the tracking sheet. This would once again give students a quick way to recall the past words of the day. If students kept them in their notebooks, it would give them a reference to use for their homework and independent studies. Finally, because very often a student can fall behind because of poor organizational skills, I have created a Word of the Day Book - both in English and Spanish - that students can keep in their office or backpacks. This vocabulary builder is something that students can record and keep as a reference for their future class work. Depending on the needs of her students, Ms. Noonan now has a few choices to help solidify her word from the lessons of the day. Students who forget the word during class time would be able to use the poster as their quick reference. Students who work from home would have all their past words of the day in their book for a quick spelling check or to find one of the words they have difficulty remembering. In all these cases, it is a matter of superimposing supports in the physical space of the classroom. If you have other ideas, be sure to share them.
